Ethics. Credits for these classes are transferrable to Arizona's three state universities.

For students with **INTERNET** access, NPC is offering **52** classes from nine departments.

A variety of noncredit "**LEARNING ADVENTURES**" classes and workshops are also planned.

The maximum credit load for the summer is **12 CREDITS** due to the concentrated nature of the instruction.

Students utilizing financial aid this summer must enroll before **MAY 2**. There will be no registration on May 3 as financial aid awards are finalized.

Spanish studies in Costa Rica this summer

Spend four weeks immersed in the culture of Costa Rica this summer, studying Spanish in a study abroad program sponsored by NPC's Student Government Association (SGA).

Open to the general public, the **STUDY ABROAD PROGRAM** offers beginning and advanced Spanish studies at the University of Costa Rica. Students will earn six credits while attending weekday classes for four weeks, **JUNE 30** to **JULY 31**. The cost for tuition, room and 2 meals per day is **\$1,985**, plus a **\$100** application fee and airfare. Participants are responsible for obtaining their own passports and textbooks.

Program applications, available at campus or center offices or online at www.npc.edu/costa_rica, are due by MAY 16. SGA wants to support and encourage continuing education by providing one \$1,985 scholarship and up to four \$250 grants to those students who have proven their ability to excel in their studies.
